The Spring 2022 semester is going to be a busy time packed with activities and events. The much-anticipated AUSMUN annual conference is going to take place at the end of February. We have also planned monthly department colloquia, including a special session scheduled in April when a winner of this year's Undergraduate Research Grant will present his research findings. Please stay tuned for the announcements of upcoming events.

Our department has also grown in other ways. Last October, we welcomed the arrival of baby Zorah Niamh Lusk, the newest member of the Lusk family. Following a short maternity leave, Dr. Jeniece Lusk has returned to teach this semester. Dr. Bethany Shockley is now on maternity leave taking care of her newborn son. We expect her return in Fall 2022. Congratulations to both Dr. Lusk and Dr. Shockley.

MEET THE NEW FACULTY

In each issue of INScription, we ask one or two faculty members to tell us a bit more about themselves. In this issue, the faculty members under the spotlight are Dr. Salma Thani and Dr. Rachel Blaser, who joined us in January as visiting faculty.

Dr. Salma Thani

I was born and raised in the UAE. I grew up on the east side of the country, where mountains were on my doorstep. My childhood was quite adventurous. My extended family and I went fishing, camping and the beach almost every weekend. Weekend picnics were very much part of my childhood. My siblings, cousins and I used to love being taken to the parks. We would all play games together. Malls were there, but not many. The only major malls in Dubai were Al Ghurair, Al Mulla Plaza and Bur Juman. I witnessed the years when the UAE dunes gave way to skyscrapers, luxury villas and malls. I always preferred the outdoors to malls, though. I was all for outdoor activities and picnics. Picnics really brought us all together as a family every week. My family has been my most significant support. My father has been my inspiration. When I was a child, he spent hours talking with us about global affairs, society, politics and humanity. I grew up on a farm in rural Nebraska (USA), where we had at various times sheep, pigs, ducks, horses and even a peacock. I majored in psychology in college and instantly fell in love with research—my favorite class was Psycholinguistics, or how the brain learns, understands and produces language. I learned two important lessons from my research as an undergraduate: (1) I definitely wanted to spend my career doing more research, and (2) I definitely did not want to do it with human subjects (they're a real pain to work with!!). So, I pursued my graduate degree doing research on learning in honeybees, who are far more compliant and have fewer scheduling conflicts. Although I still do research on learning (and use rats, zebrafish and humans as well!), recent events around the world have made me really appreciate how important scientific literacy is for everyone—not just college students and future scientists. Whether people are deciding whether to get a vaccine or figuring out how to respond to climate change, valuing and understanding scientific information is essential to making the world a better place. So, I've more recently turned my attention to the psychological principles at work when we use (or don't use) scientific information to make decisions. Scientists still have a lot to learn about how to present research in a way that is accessible and engaging to the rest of the world!

International Studies Student Association (INSA)

The International Studies Student Association is committed to its mission to stimulate political, social, and economic discussions and debates on campus in order to engage AUS students with the world's recent issues. We have, to our best abilities, delivered a safe and engaging environment for said discussions and debates during the fall semester. We invited students from all colleges to our first INSA Majlis on the International Day for the Eradication of Poverty. The event hosted two professionals from the field, Dr. Mansa King from INS and Dr. Vidya Diwakar, an AUS alumna and Research Fellow at London-based Overseas Development Institute (ODI). Dr. King spoke to us about the poverty eradication techniques in the religion of Islam, which many of the students found interesting and relevant to our part of the world. On the other hand, Dr. Diwakar presented us with rich statistical evidence she used in her own studies. The event indeed sparked the conversation we aimed to host on our platform. Students from INS and other majors engaged in debate and discussions with each other, professors and other professionals in the field.

AUS Model Congress (AUSMC)

AUS Model Congress 2021 was a festival of events, insights, ideas and discussions. Over the last year, AUSMC held several events to enhance learning on the current issues in the United States and develop useful skills. Starting off with two sessions of AUSMC Debates in the summer, we were able to engage four qualified students in a discussion on relevant topics, giving them an opportunity to speak their mind and hone their communication skills. Second, AUSMC held a panel discussion to inform students on what the US Congress is with Dr. Alejandro Bonvecchi and Dr. Vernon Pederson from INS. Third, AUSMC held a research workshop with Dr. Maya Aghasi of the AUS Department of English assisting every senior struggling to publish a stellar paper. Fourth, AUSMC hosted an interactive workshop on visualizing ideas with Dr. Kristen Highland of the AUS Department of English. These events culminated into AUSMC's annual conference: the Govern-Pitch Competition. This two-day event was hosted using the pitch format where each team was given a relevant issue in the US, and presented a solution. Standing by its motto "if you don't like the rules, rewrite them," AUSMC strives to continue making a positive difference and giving students a platform to rise, and know about their strengths, while exploring the pressing issues of the largest economy in the world.

AUS Model United Nations (AUSMUN)

Over the last semester, AUSMUN organized several successful events including PINKTOBER and UN Day. PINKTOBER event was held on October 12, 2021 via Zoom with renowned clinical dietician and breast cancer survivor Tina Chagoury. The event was an emotional experience that inspired everyone. Moreover, the celebration of UN Day was a remarkable event for AUSMUN because it provided a background on how the UN came to be and it shed light on the struggles of refugees, with guest speaker Bisan Salameh, Officer at UNHCR at the UN Refugee Agency. The event took place on October 19, 2021 via Zoom and was filled with curious attendees.

Psychology Club

The Psychology Club at AUS is dedicated to advocating for mental health and wellness, delivering research-based psychoeducation, and promoting awareness campaigns to combat stigma and misconceptions. To achieve these goals, the club held several events during the fall semester. One key event focused on men's mental health. Coach Michael Leonard, Middle East Mental Health Ambassador Ally Salama, and podcast host and AUS student Ali Mortada discussed societal stigmas and the effect of upbringing on the way men express emotions or discuss mental health in general. The club also hosted an online workshop on positive psychology. Club President Neimat Elkarib provided an overview of the field, highlighting the benefits of implementing positive psychology practices to cope with the demands and rigor of university. Students then joined breakout sessions: one a guided breath practice with psychology professor Dr. Angela Maitner and another on flow and play with visiting psychology professor Dr. Katherine Green.



Other Departmental Events

The department organized two alumni events and three department colloquia in Fall 2021, involving three alumni, two faculty members and an external speaker.

Psi Chi

AUS launched our chapter of Psi Chi in April 2021, becoming the first chapter of the international honors society in psychology in the UAE. The purpose of Psi Chi is to promote excellence in the science and practice of psychology. This fall, we organized the first psychology alumni panel at AUS, welcoming back four AUS alumni who have gone on to graduate school in psychology. We joined Psi Chi's International Partners and Leaders (IPALs) program, partnering with Florida State University. Together we held regular book club meetings discussing Oliver Sack's *The Man Who Mistook His Wife for a Hat*. We are also a member of Psi Chi's 2021-2022 International Collaborative Exchange collaborative research project, and established a social media and online presence for our chapter. Psychology majors and minors who've completed 45 credits and score in the top 35th percentile in CAS are eligible for membership, which provides them with lifetime benefits including opportunities for financial grants and scholarships, publication venues, information on career opportunities and networking mixers.
